2050X FUND

Deadline: 31 January 2022

Grants available of up to £1,000, from the 2050 Climate Group's Leaders Network, for climate change projects. Open to young people aged 18-35 in Scotland.

CORRA FOUNDATION - #SHIFTTHEPOWER SCOTLAND COMIC RELIEF FUND

Deadline: 12pm on 8 March 2022

#ShiftThePower supports organisations with passionate people to make meaningful change in their communities. In 2022, the fund will be open to grassroots organisations and charities with an income of £250,000 or less whose work fits one of two strategic themes:

- **Children Survive and Thrive** – Supporting children to survive and thrive during the first years of life (0-5 years old) through targeted work and opportunities for children and families facing disadvantage.
- **Mental Health Matters** – Supporting people with mental health issues or challenges to share their stories, live free from stigma and discrimination, and build positive relationships and experiences.

THE AUSTIN AND HOPE PILKINGTON TRUST

Opens: 1 February 2022

Deadline: 28 February 2022

The Austin and Hope Pilkington Trust will be opening the latest round of their grants programme on February 1st. Named 'Arts for All', the round will focus on supporting performers and creatives in the early stages of their careers. £1,000 is available to apply for.

HIGHLANDS AND ISLANDS CLIMATE CHANGE COMMUNITY GRANTS

Deadline: 31 January 2022, 5pm

Community groups in the Highlands and Islands are encouraged to apply for a grant of up to £4,500 to run projects on climate change issues in collaboration with researchers from the British Science Association (BSA) through the Climate Change Community Grants Scheme.

They are keen to see evidence in the project proposal of wide engagement from a community - think "bottom-up" rather than "top-down" - in terms of the need, decision-making and activities with the researcher too.

You don't need to have worked with a researcher before and you don't need to have partnered with one before the deadline - just tell us what your idea is and how a researcher might be able to help in terms of exchanging (in both directions!) skills, knowledge and supporting action.

FAMILY FUND - FUNDING FOR CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE WITH DISABILITY OR ILLNESS

Deadline: Ongoing

Family Fund has received funding of £300,000 from the Scottish Government to support children and young people who are in need of additional support due to disability, disabling condition or serious illness.

YOUTH SCOTLAND WINTER FUND

Deadline: Ongoing

Supported by STV Children's Appeal and the Scottish Government, Youth Scotland have reopened their Winter Fund for a second year. The fund supports disadvantaged children, young people and families, who are affected by poverty and hardship, by providing funds to help buy food, clothing, heating and other essentials. Youth Scotland member groups can apply for £500-£3,000 to help support families.

Aberlour's Urgent Assistance Fund

Deadline: Ongoing

Aberlour's Urgent Assistance Fund welcomes applications from sponsors (including third sector organisations) to help families in Scotland who are struggling financially. Cash grants are available to families with children under the age of 21 to assist with the purchasing of food, utilities, clothing, appliance repairs and other essential needs.

SOCIAL SECURITY SCOTLAND - BEST START GRANTS

Deadline: Ongoing

Social Security Scotland is accepting applications for Best Start Grants and Best Start Food payments.

The Best Start Grant consists of 3 one-off payments:

- Pregnancy and Baby Payment
- Early Learning Payment
- School Age Payment

Best Start Foods Payments are also available to help families buy healthy foods using a pre-paid card.

SCOTTISH EDGE

Deadline: 15th February 2022

Scottish EDGE is a competition aimed at identifying and supporting Scotland's up-and-coming, innovative, high-growth potential entrepreneurial talent. You should have an ambitious growth strategy and a commitment to deliver upon it. You must be head-quartered in, or relocating to, Scotland and aiming to attain at a minimum £200K of increased sales over the next three years.

FOUNDATION SCOTLAND - SCOTCH WHISKY ACTION FUND

Deadline: 25 April 2022, 12pm

The Fund will support and develop a range of projects/initiatives which deliver targeted interventions designed to tackle alcohol-related harms across three themes: young people (aged under 18); families; communities. The Fund will focus on applications from new/innovative or pilot initiatives which aims to test new approaches and which will offer an opportunity for learning that others can use.

MOVEMBER - SCALING WHAT WORKS

Deadline: 31 January 2022

Movember have a new large Mental Health Grants Funding Program aiming to strengthen the implementation and evaluation of scalable initiatives which currently exist in both the community and/or workplace.

This funding will support initiatives with a focus on scaling initiatives that have already shown promise in improving mental health and/or suicide prevention outcomes for boys and men. The primary purpose of the funding is to identify current programs with an underlying evidence-base, assisting partners to scale their reach and impact, ultimately fast-tracking improvements in the mental health and wellbeing of boys and men.

CORRA FOUNDATION - WINTER SUPPORT SMALL GRANTS FUND

Deadline: 2nd February 2022

The purpose of the Winter Support Small Grants Fund is to provide small grants to charities and community groups across Scotland who can pass the funding on to families and individuals on low incomes. They expect that successful applicants to this fund will be organisations who are already supporting families and individuals on low incomes through other activities.

This might include projects such as: children's groups, lunch clubs, churches/faith groups, youth groups, food pantries/banks. Examples of what cash payments or vouchers could cover: - food/essential items - fuel costs - phone/internet costs - warm clothing - extra costs over the holiday season (for example gifts for children) - other essentials that you can show are needed by the people you support.

UFI CHARITABLE TRUST - VOCTECH SEED

There will be two VocTech Seed calls in 2022:

Call 1 opens on 12 January and closes at 5pm on 9 February 2022

Call 2 opens on 15 June and closes at 5pm on 13 July 2022

Next Deadline: 9 February 2022

The VocTech Seed fund helps create a pipeline of new learning solutions by supporting innovative and creative projects at an early stage of development, enabling new ideas to reach a point where they can demonstrate their potential to customers or funders and reach the market. Funding is to support the development of early stage ideas, small scale testing, proof of concept work and the development of strategies to scale once Ufi funding has ended.

This call will support projects that show the potential to have a real impact in the world of vocational learning, and to ultimately make a difference to how people learn and to the number of people gaining new skills. Projects must aim to improve outcomes for learners and improve the quality of vocational teaching and training.

SEA-CHANGERS COASTAL FOUNTAIN FUND 2022

Deadline: 13 February 2022

The purpose of the fund is to reduce the impact of single-use plastic water bottles on coastal habitats by funding communities to purchase water drinking fountains and install them for use by the public in busy or environmentally important areas. So far we've funded 10 fountains around the UK with more imminent!

Grants of up to £2,000 are available, per applicant, towards the cost of a fountain.

We welcome applications from all types of not-for-profit organisations who have identified a need and are well-placed to get the stakeholder involvement needed to make the project a success. We particularly welcome applications from Wales, Scotland and Northeast and Northwest England as these areas have been under-represented in previous years.

YEAR OF STORIES 2022 - COMMUNITY STORIES FUND

Deadline: 18 March 2022, 5pm

Organisations and groups working with communities can apply for up to £5000 to take part in and celebrate Scotland's Year of Stories 2022, with new, creative events, activities and programming, spotlighting stories inspired by, created, or written in Scotland.

WORKPLACE EQUALITY FUND

Deadline: 11th of April 2022

In partnership with the Scottish Government, Advice Direct Scotland will be administering the delivery of the latest iteration of the Workplace Equality Fund (WEF) – a source of financial support for Scottish businesses and organisations striving to improve equality-related outcomes for priority groups within the workplace. By supporting employers to address and resolve longstanding barriers facing under-represented groups within the labour market, the fund endeavours to promote and embed principles of inclusivity and fairness within Scotland's workplaces.

The central goal of the fund is to incentivise and support collaborative projects that aspire to reduce employment inequalities and cultivate positive, fair, and inclusive workplace practices. To this end, we are seeking to distribute £800,000 per annum to eligible partnership projects which focus on supporting one or more of the following priority groups:

- Women
- Women returning to the workforce following a career break
- Disabled workers
- Minority ethnic workers
- Over-50s workers
- Workers experiencing gender-based violence
- Workers experiencing symptoms of the menopause
- Workers experiencing social isolation and/or loneliness
- Veterans and spouses of veterans

Projects can apply for a maximum of £75,000 per year (i.e., an overall total of £150,000 across a 2-year period). Note that projects requesting a value of less than £20,000 per year are unlikely to be accepted given the relative likelihood of weak impact on the priority groups

CREATIVE SCOTLAND CROWDMATCH LIVE + LEARN: INTRODUCTION TO CROWDFUNDING

Creative Scotland and Crowdfunder have teamed up to launch Creative Scotland Crowdmatch which will award up to £10,000 to creative projects across the country. To help with the process they are also hosting a workshop.

LET'S DO NET ZERO: OFF ELECTRICITY GRID COMMUNITIES FUND

Deadline for Expressions of Interest: 31 January 2022

This fund aims to decarbonise and future-proof the existing local independent electrical grids of those communities that are not connected to the national electricity grid. CARES funding available through this call is to develop and deliver specific capital projects.

There is no specific deadline for full applications for this funding call. However, to provide an indication of likely budget requirements please complete and submit the expression of interest by 31 January 2022.

AGNES HUNTER TRUST SCIO

Deadline: 24 February 2022, 5pm

The Agnes Hunter Trust SCIO was established in 1954 to support registered charities delivering health and social welfare projects in Scotland. In 2021 the Trust converted to become a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO). The Trust operates one Grants Programme (grants over £3,000) and applications must be submitted via the online forms.

The Trust focuses on two key areas of funding support:

- Charities that help disabled people.
- Charities that assist with the education and training of disadvantaged people aged 16 years or over who have left school.

CREATE:INCLUSION FUND

Round three is now open for applications, and will close at **12 noon on 16 February 2022**.

This fund seeks to increase the diversity of people in the arts and creative industries.

Applicants can seek funding to help them progress, develop their creative and professional practice and capacity, or to support them to take professional and creative risks.

The Fund is open to individual creative practitioners, organisations, groups and networks in the arts and creative industries.

We particularly encourage applications from individuals who self-identify as sharing one or more protected characteristics defined by the Equality Act 2010; or from groups/organisations which are either minority-led or which focus on working with and for those who share one or more protected characteristics.

CULTURE & BUSINESS FUND SCOTLAND

This fund enables businesses and arts or heritage organisations to come together and build effective, sustainable partnerships, bringing creative projects – large and small – vividly to life. Funded by the Scottish Government via Creative Scotland and Historic Environment Scotland, and managed by Arts & Business Scotland, the CBFS provides critical £ for £ match funding – making the journey from a great idea, to a great project, possible.

FILM DEVELOPMENT AND PRODUCTION FUND / SCREEN SCOTLAND

Deadline: 31 May 2022 at 23:55

This fund exists to offer development and production funding for feature length films and documentaries being made by filmmakers based in Scotland.

This fund can support the following stages of the process:

→ Single Project Development Funding: support towards the initial development costs of a single feature film or documentary project.

→ Film Production Funding: support towards the production costs for a film or documentary project

OPEN FUND | CREATIVE SCOTLAND

Deadline: 31 March 2022 at 23:00

The Open Fund supports a wide range of activity initiated by organisations, artists, writers, producers and other creative practitioners in Scotland.

We have two strands – one for individuals and one for organisations, so the two are not in competition with each other for funds. These strands have separate budgets and applications are considered at separate panels.

Open Fund for Individuals

The Open Fund will support a period of research, development and/or delivery of creative activity for up to 24 months. The fund is for freelance and self-employed artists and creative practitioners living in Scotland who are at least 18 years old.

This fund can support applications for between £500 and £100,000. There are no deadlines for this fund - you can apply year-round.

Open Fund: Sustaining Creative Development

The Open Fund: Sustaining Creative Development aims to enable organisations to explore ways of working that will help them to adapt and respond to the current changing circumstances for up to 12 months.

This fund can support applications for between £1,000 and £100,000. There are no deadlines for this fund - you can apply year-round.

PRODUCTION GROWTH FUND / SCREEN SCOTLAND

Deadline: 31 May 2022 at 23:55

This fund supports the growth of Scotland's screen production sector, creating employment opportunities, encouraging the use of facilities and providing opportunities for Scotland-based producers.

- What will we fund?

We will fund live-action and animated features, and live-action and animated high-end television drama series that demonstrate the ability to create employment opportunities for crew, that utilise production facilities companies based in Scotland, provide co-production opportunities for producers based in Scotland and that deliver a direct and significant economic benefit to the screen production sector in Scotland.

- What can I apply for?

→ Awards are likely to range from £200,000 up to a maximum of £500,000.
→ The ratio of the Estimated Scottish Spend to the level of funding requested should be a minimum of 8:1.

OTHER FUNDS (PREVIOUSLY LISTED)

[CREATIVE SCOTLAND COVID-19 CANCELLATION FUND FOR CREATIVE FREELANCERS](#)

Grants of between £500 and £2,000 are available to support freelance creative professionals based in Scotland who work in the arts, screen and creative sector, and who are experiencing immediate financial difficulty due to the cancellation or deferral of events because of Covid-19, that were due to take place between 27th November 2021 and 31st March 2022.

This can include the cancellation or deferral of performances, productions, exhibitions and shows from which freelancers would have received income.

You will need to provide a CV and written evidence that you had a performance, exhibition or show planned, and separate written evidence that it has been cancelled or deferred. This fund has a set budget and it is anticipated that there will be a high level of demand – so if you are eligible, you are advised to apply as soon as possible.

INVESTING IN COMMUNITIES FUND 2023-2026

This Scottish Government funding programme will have an annual budget of approximately £10m per year during the period of 1 April 2023 to 31 March 2026. It is designed to support revenue projects, but can consider a small complementary capital budget.

Grants up to £350k are available over a three consecutive financial years, with a maximum of £150k in any one financial year. The minimum available in any one financial year is £5k.

Successful applicants will be expected to commence project activity as soon as possible after 1 April 2023, and by no later than 30 September 2023. Applications to the Fund need to address **ALL FOUR** priority areas for action:

- Tackling Poverty & Inequality, including Child Poverty
- Developing and Sustaining Place Based Approaches
- Community-led Regeneration
- Ensuring a just transition to Net Zero

Applicants must also submit clear and concise proposals about how their proposed projects and services:

- support disadvantaged, vulnerable & fragile communities – urban, rural & island
- are inclusive, rooted in the community with strong place based collaborative partnership working
- address locally identified need, involving local people in design, development & delivery
- reflect the current context of the community you work in
- commit to the Fair Work First criteria

The following groups or organisations are eligible to apply:

- Charity / community or voluntary organisation
- Housing association / housing co-operative / registered social landlord
- Community Council
- Not for profit company / Social enterprise / Community interest company (CIC) that are based in Scotland and rooted in the community they serve

Please note the following points also apply to eligibility criteria:

- Be incorporated - **registered as a SCIO with OSCR, or a company limited by guarantee with Companies House** or;
- **Community benefit society regulated by the Financial Conduct Authority (FCA)** or;
- **Community Council with a scheme of establishment with the local authority and a written constitution**
- Have a governing body such as a board or committee and a governing document

- Meaningfully involves local people in its decision making processes
- Be solvent, and hold a UK bank account
- Have annual accounts

The indicative timeline for potential applicants is as follows:

Fund opens:	March/April 2022
Fund closes:	4-6 week application window
Independent panel assessment:	October 2022
Applicants notified of decision:	November 2022
Grant Offer letters issued by no later than:	March 2023
Project start:	April – September 2023

FAMILY FUND SEEKING APPLICATIONS FROM FAMILIES IN SCOTLAND

Deadline: February 2022

Family Fund - a charity that provides grants to families raising a disabled or seriously ill child or young person - is calling for more families in Scotland to apply for a grant before February 2022. Thanks to funding from the Scottish Government, they have grants available for essential items such as clothing, computer equipment, family breaks, domestic appliances or sensory toys and play equipment.

SCOTTISH RECOVERY CONSORTIUM – RECOVERY SEED FUND

The Scottish Recovery Consortium (SRC) Recovery Seed Fund is available to all new (under 12 months) & unconstituted Lived Experience recovery groups/organisations, with an initial award of up to £5000 on offer to help towards start-up & running costs. A key advantage of this fund is the additional on-going support that will be given to develop your group/organisation to become sustainable, skilled and independent.

CO-OP COMMUNITY FRIDGE FUND: ROUND 2

Deadline: 1 February 2022

Co-op has teamed up with the Hubbub Foundation to offer grants up to £4,000 to enable voluntary and community groups to establish new community fridge projects. Full support, guidance and resources are also available to ensure your new Fridge is a success.

NATIONAL EMERGENCIES TRUST: LOCAL ACTION FUND

NET has teamed up with Crowdfunder to offer match-funding grants up to £10,000 to voluntary and community organisations for a wide variety of projects to address the effects of the pandemic. NET will match-fund individual donations pound for pound. Apply any time.

MCS CERTIFICATION FUND

The MCS certification fund will provide heating engineers with funds to pay their first year fees to become MCS certified on heat pumps (either air, ground or water source). This grant will pay 75% of the certification fees up to a maximum of £1,000 and will run until the end of March 2022 or until all funds have been allocated. Please note that funding cannot be offered retrospectively to those who are already MCS certified, this scheme is only for those are not yet MCS certified for heat pumps.

SUPPORTING BIRTH PARENTS WHOSE CHILD(REN) HAVE BEEN PERMANENTLY REMOVED FROM THEIR CARE

Deadline: 12 noon on 27 January 2022

Managed by the [Corra Foundation](#), this Scottish Government fund aims to improve support for birth parents who no longer have care of their children on a permanent basis as a result of child protection processes. Funding will be awarded to organisations that are already working directly with birth parents who are or have been subject to Child Protection proceedings

SHETLAND CHARITABLE TRUST'S SMALL GRANTS SCHEME

Deadline: 26 January 2022

This fund can provide up to 75% of eligible costs and offer grants between £500 - £5,000 to groups with an annual turnover below £50,000. Community projects across a range of fields including social care and welfare, arts & culture, environment or sport & recreation may be considered.

Applicants are required to demonstrate how their project will contribute towards the Trust's ambitions of promoting inclusion and/or reducing inequalities in Shetland as well as the impact and outcomes delivered.

CORRA FOUNDATION: SCOTTISH GOVERNMENT WINTER SUPPORT SMALL GRANTS FUND

Deadline: 27 January 2022, 12pm

Grants from £500 to £5,000 are available to small charities, community groups and social enterprises to support families and individuals on low incomes with vouchers or cash for food, fuel, household items, clothing or extra costs over the holiday period (for example gifts for children). **Apply by 16 December if funding is needed before Christmas.** Decisions will be made on a rolling basis and please note the fund may close early if all the money has been allocated.

CORRA FOUNDATION: SCOTTISH GOVERNMENT FUNDING DRUGS SERVICES FUNDS

LOCAL SUPPORT FUND

Rolling application programme

- Focused on community-based organisations which deliver frontline services to support people who use or used drugs, people in recovery and families affected by someone else's drug use.
- Funding of up to £50,000 per year for five years, which can be used for existing or expanded service delivery, general running costs, staffing, equipment, etc.
- Open to organisations with an annual income of up to £500,000 i.e. charities, social enterprises, community groups and other voluntary organisations

MICRO GRANTS

Rolling application programme

- Focused on small community-based groups which deliver frontline services to support people who use or used drugs, people in recovery and families affected by someone else's drug use.
- Funding of between £1,000 to £10,000 per year for up to five years.
- Open to organisations with an annual income of up to £50,000 i.e. charities, social enterprises or constituted community/voluntary groups that operate on a not-for-profit basis.

CORONAVIRUS (COVID-19): BUSINESS VENTILATION FUND

Deadline: 31 March 2022

The Scottish Government's [Business Ventilation Fund](#) will help organisations improve ventilation and air quality on their premises to help reduce the spread of COVID-19. Organisations can claim up to £2,500 per eligible premises to recover the costs of carrying out work to improve ventilation and air quality. This could include:

- installing of carbon dioxide monitors
- repairs to windows and vents

To be eligible for funding, organisations must:

- be a small or medium-sized enterprise
- be in an eligible sector
- have physical premises
- pay non-domestic rates

Support will initially target high-risk settings where people come into close contact, such as restaurants, bars and gyms. Social enterprises, Trusts, Partnerships, Community Interest Companies or Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisations may apply for funding provided they meet all other [eligibility criteria](#).

MUSEUMS GALLERIES SCOTLAND - SMALL GRANTS FUND

Deadline: 28th Jan 2022

This first round of the MGS Small Grants fund will focus on supporting accredited museums to get back on track after an extremely difficult year. It is designed to be flexible so that it can respond to the changing needs of the sector as it starts to recover from the impacts of the pandemic. It will cover small-scale project activity, as well as resource and activity that is not project based, providing it will deliver outcomes in one or more of these areas:

- Building organisational resilience
- Re-engaging with audiences
- Critical repairs and maintenance
- Environmental sustainability

CREATIVE LIVES - TOGETHER AGAIN MICRO GRANTS

Deadline: 31 January 2022

As creative groups start to meet up in person again, Creative Lives is offering 18 micro-grants to help make that happen. In particular, these 'Together Again' grants are to help groups or projects based in areas of Scotland, or with participants, experiencing deprivation. You can use the grants for anything that will help your creative group meet up in person again (or help get a new group off the ground). Examples include:

- Enhanced cleaning for your venue
- Hall hire (if you temporarily need to move to a bigger space)
- To cover transport costs that enable participation (if using public transport is now difficult)
- To cover artists costs to reinvigorate or kick-start your activity
- New materials (e.g. if your art materials have been lost through lack of use; you can no longer share certain items)

FLEXIBLE WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT FUND (FWDF)

(Access up to £5k of Funding for Training)

Deadline: 21 July 2022

The Flexible Workforce Development Fund is now available to all organisations operating within Scotland across the private, public or third sector through North East

Scotland College (NESCol). Small and medium-sized enterprises can receive funding of up to £5,000. The fund can be used to completely cover training costs, or to partially cover training at a higher cost. The deadline for applications is 31 July 2022. Don't delay as funds may be fully issued before this deadline.

UK GOVERNMENT - COMMUNITY OWNERSHIP FUND

Round 2 will open in December 2021 and Round 3 in May 2022.

The UK government has launched a new £150 million Community Ownership Fund to help ensure that communities across England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland can support and continue benefiting from the local facilities, community assets and amenities most important to them. The priorities for the first round are to invest in projects which are ready to access capital funding and complete their projects within 6 months. Voluntary and community groups can bid for match funding to help them buy or take over local community assets at risk of being lost, to run as community-owned businesses. Funding may support the purchase and/or renovation costs of community assets and amenities.

Proposals will need to prove the value of the asset to local people and that the asset can run sustainably for the long-term benefit of the community. The fund will support a range of community ownership proposals. For example, projects may include: - sporting and leisure facilities - cinemas and theatres - music venues - museums - galleries - parks - pubs - post office buildings - shops The Community Ownership Fund will provide up to 50% of total capital costs, matching other funds and resources raised by the applicant. Bidders can also apply for some revenue funding to help with the associated revenue costs of taking an asset into community ownership. PATHS FOR ALL: THE SMARTER CHOICES, SMARTER PLACES (SCSP) OPEN FUND

The Smarter Choices, Smarter Places (SCSP) Open Fund aims to encourage people to change their everyday travel behaviours. Grants are available to encourage people to use buses and community car clubs for longer journeys; walking and cycling for short journeys, and home-working to replace daily commutes.

The Open Fund is available to support public, third and community sector organisations. The fund aims to help cut Scotland's carbon emissions and improve our air quality. It will also help reverse the trend towards sedentary lifestyles and will tackle health inequalities. Grants available are between £5000 and £50,000 and need to be match funded.

ESMÉE FAIRBAIRN FOUNDATION: IMPROVING OUR NATURAL WORLD

Grants are available to community or charitable organisations with annual income in excess of £100,000 for projects that preserve and improve species health and habitats; promote sustainable and ethical food; and ensure clean and healthy freshwater. Apply any time.

CLOTHWORKERS' COMPANY: CHARITY GOVERNANCE AWARDS

Deadline: 26 January 2022

The Charity Governance Awards highlight inspirational success stories from charities that can demonstrate outstanding governance. They showcase how good charity governance has a direct impact to improve the lives of the people and causes they support. Boards can apply within four categories with prizes of £5,000 awarded to the winner of each category. Entry is free.

VICTIM CENTRED APPROACH FUND

The Victim-Centred Approach Fund (VCAF) is a new Scottish Government funding programme which will invest at least £10 million per year to provide practical and emotional support to victims, survivors and witnesses of crime across Scotland. The first round of the VCAF will open for applications in October 2021 and funding is available for three years from April 2022 until March 2025.

Applications are welcome from third sector organisations, community interest companies and public bodies that have a focus on providing support to victims, survivors and witnesses of crime in Scotland. [Register your interest in applying to the VCAF.](#)

FOUNDATION SCOTLAND: BAILLIE GIFFORD GRASSROOTS SPORTS FUND

Grants up to £5,000 are available for small, grassroots sports organisations to enable people of all ages and abilities to participate in sport and improve the sustainability of clubs, including general running costs. Apply any time.

YOUTHLINK SCOTLAND SOCIAL ISOLATION AND LONELINESS FUND (ROUND TWO)

As part of the Scottish Government's commitment to addressing social isolation and loneliness, YouthLink Scotland has received £240,000 to allocate to youth work groups and organisations supporting young people most affected by social isolation and loneliness. Grants of up to £5,000 are available.

SUSTRANS LOVE YOUR NETWORK GRANT

Deadline: 6 February 2022

Community groups can apply for equipment and training to engage with spaces along the National Cycle Network and learn how to support its wildlife. Groups can access: Litter-picking equipment to transform the safety and attractiveness of your local path; Training with a wildlife expert to learn how to record the birds, bees and butterflies in your area. SHETLAND ARTS: [VISUAL ARTIST AND CRAFT MAKER AWARDS](#)

Deadline: Tuesday 1 February 2022 (5pm)

Shetland Arts, in partnership with Creative Scotland and Shetland Islands Council, invite applications from artists and makers for bursaries of £500 or £750 towards their creative and professional development. The Visual Artist and Craft Maker Awards (VACMA) are a programme of small grant schemes, supported and administered by a range of local authorities and art agencies across Scotland to support visual artists and craft makers. There are two strands, one for Established Artists (£750) and one for Emerging Artists / Recent Graduates (£500).

[SHETLAND COMMUNITY BENEFIT FUND – ADVANCE GRANT SCHEME](#)

The Advance Grant Scheme is financed by the Viking Community Fund, will run during the construction of the wind farm and is open to a wide range of organisations in Shetland – whether a local group or Shetland-wide – and even businesses and individuals in some circumstances

The scheme is run by Shetland Community Benefit Fund and only projects supported by one of the islands' 18 community councils can qualify for funding. There are two tiers for applications – Tier One for small projects of £50 – £500 and Tier Two for projects over £500. All the documents are available on the website. You are strongly advised to read the Guidelines for Applicants first. These will have to be accepted for any application to be successful. Please also read the SCBF policies.

There are separate application forms for Tier One and Tier Two applications. If you are wanting to apply for funding over £5,000 you must first [email](#) a summary of the proposal with costs to SCBF before any application is submitted.
