BETTER COMMUNITY BUSINESS NETWORK - GRANT INITIATIVE	16 February 2025	BCBN's Grant Initiative aims to provide small third-sector grant awards to empower charities and local community projects. This initiative will distribute a one-off grant award of up to £3,000 per charity or to small but credible community projects, which are able to demonstrate their positive impact on the communities they aim to serve.  Any projects supported must be UK based (excluding Northern Ireland); address a community issue or support a local community initiative; and provide benefits to the local community.  Complete the grant eligibility quiz prior to downloading the application. Then download and complete the Application Form and email it to grants@bcbn.org.uk
BRITISH FILM INSTITUTE - BFI NATIONAL LOTTERY AUDIENCE PROJECTS FUND	Rolling	The BFI National Lottery Audience Projects Fund supports ambitious, audience-facing independent UK and international film and broader screen activity of national scale.  Projects should be focused on increasing access and growing the participation of audiences that are representative of the UK population. Equal priority will be given to the cultural and social ambitions of projects, and they expect these two ambitions to work together to realise the fund's aims. The fund will support film exhibitors, film distributors, and other organisations delivering audience development activity with multi-year and short-term projects as well as research and development.  Applications are accepted all year round but must be submitted 16 weeks before the start of any funded

		activity. They can support projects of any duration but all activity must be completed by 31 March 2026 unless you have approval from the Audiences team prior to making an application.
BRITISH SCIENCE ASSOCIATION - ENGAGE GRANTS / ENGAGE SIMPLY CREST	5pm on Tuesday 4 February 2025.	<ul> <li>CREST offers educators an easy-to-run framework for curriculum enhancement and is student-led, encouraging young people to take ownership of their own projects. CREST can be run in schools, clubs, youth groups, other organisations or at home.</li> <li>Engage: Grant The Engage Grant is £350 grant money for your school to run CREST Awards, which you can spend on materials, equipment, a field trip, teacher CPD and more. Plus, awardees will also receive up to £350 CREST Awards for free.</li> <li>Engage: Simply CREST - BSA want more young people – particularly those most likely to be underrepresented in STEM - to have their project work celebrated through getting a CREST Award. BSA don't want even the relatively low cost of CREST submission fees to be a barrier, so they are offering Engage Simply CREST - a simple way to access free CREST Awards. There is no cash grant; successful applicants that do CREST projects in their school will be get up to £350 CREST Awards for free. That's enough to recognise and reward a whole year group in many secondary schools, or even a whole primary school. A main grant of £10,000 is available annually to UK-registered charities and Community Interest Companies (CICs) with an annual income of up to £5 million. Additionally, a mini-grant of £1,000 is available to unincorporated non-profits, including unregistered charities and community groups.

SHETLAND CHARITABLE TRUST - SMALL GRANTS	Friday 24th January 2025	A fund offering grants of up to £5,000 for small community groups in Shetland has opened to applications for financial year 2025/26.
SCHEME		In line with all SCT's grant aid, the Small Grant Scheme aims to support community based voluntary and charitable organisations to provide services and associated facilities that help individuals and the community to thrive. Awards can cover up to 90 per cent of a project's costs.
		The scheme is open to constituted community groups with a turnover of less than £100,000 a year. They need to demonstrate in their application that they support SCT's Quality of Life Goals: community wellbeing, individual wellbeing, everyone matters and generational fairness.
		The scheme is open to requests for help with running costs and buying equipment or adapting buildings. Applications for revenue funding can be for a minimum of one year but the trust will consider multi-year funding to a maximum of 5 years.

VICTIM SUPPORT SCOTLAND - VICTIM'S FUND	The Victims' Fund is open to people affected by crime across Scotland, who are in urgent need of financial help as a result of what they have experienced. People can access assistance for a wide range of goods and services where they have no other access to funds.
	Administered by Victim Support Scotland, it is open to any victim of crime who is resident in Scotland who is currently accessing victim and other support services. It is also available for people who live outside of Scotland who have been bereaved by a crime that has occurred within Scotland. Support organisations can apply for funding on behalf of victims. NB Applications must be endorsed and submitted by a referral organisation acting in their professional capacity.
VISUAL ARTIST AND CRAFT MAKER AWARDS 2024/25	Shetland Arts, in partnership with Creative Scotland and Shetland Islands Council, invite applications from artists and makers for bursaries of £500 or £1,000 towards their creative and professional development.
	The Visual Artist and Craft Maker Awards (VACMA) are a programme of small grant schemes delivered in partnership with a range of local authorities and art organisations across Scotland. The schemes are managed locally by these partners. VACMA offers fixed bursaries of £500 and £1,000. The purpose of these bursaries is to support visual artists and craft makers in their creative and professional development.
	Whether your medium is paint, clay, ink, metal, textiles, film, glass or something else entirely, and whatever stage in your career you're at, if you think we can help you advance your creative and professional skills we'd like to hear from you.
	<ul> <li>£1,000 Bursary is for artists and makers who have been practicing for over 5 years, regardless of whether they have gone through formal education or not.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>£500 Early-Career Bursary is for artists and makers that have been practicing for less than 5 years. This includes recent graduates (2019 or later) and those that have not studied art formally but have been practising as an artist or maker for up to 5 years.</li> </ul>

AVIVA COMMUNITY FUND	No closing date	The Aviva Community Fund helps local causes and projects – with funding, but also with access to tools and resources, like volunteering and professional coaching. It aims to help communities build the kind of long-term, sustainable projects that they need.
AVIVA COMMUNITY FUND - CROWDFUNDING REQUIRED	Ongoing	Grants up to £50,000 are available for not-for-profit organisations in the UK who can raise their initial funding through a crowdfunding campaign for projects that address Aviva's current themes of climate champions and financial empowerment.
AWARDS FOR YOUNG MUSICIANS	Anytime	Awards for Young Musicians supports outstanding young instrumentalists making music in any genre. If you can clearly show that you are talented and committed and that you need financial help with your music costs then you can apply for an Award of up to £2000. The average award in 2020 was £550. Young musicians aged between 5 and 17 years of age and are living and studying in the UK are eligible to apply.

BANK OF SCOTLAND FOUNDATION		Bank of Scotland Foundation, has announced the launch of its new five-year strategy - "Building a Brighter Future for Scotland." The strategy aims to fund, support and champion small and local charities that work towards improving the quality of life for some of Scotland's most vulnerable people.
		The first multi-year programme under the new strategy, Empower, will launch in early February, offering real security and certainty for charities. This programme will offer a three-year unrestricted grant of £150,000 (£50,000 per annum) and collaborating with Lloyds Banking Group, the Foundation also aims to identify opportunities to add strategic value for funded charities and help them grow stronger and thrive

beyond the lifetime of their grant. Two further multi-year programmes will be launched later in the year. Energise is a multi-year grants programme supporting small and local charities that are closest to the real issues facing our communities. Available to new (and more established) charities this programme offers a two-year unrestricted grant of £20,000 (£10,000 per annum), enabling charities to use their grants in the way that helps them best. The third programme, Enable, is an innovative, joint grants programme with the Foundation's sole funder, Lloyds Banking Group, aimed at boosting community volunteering. Funding will be provided to charities to support projects delivered through volunteers, with Lloyds Banking Group's colleagues across Scotland volunteering their time and skills to help deliver the projects and support the charities. This programme offers a grant of £30,000 - £90,000 over three years (£10k-£30k per annum) for volunteering projects/costs/initiatives. Grants programmes 2024 **EMPOWER:** To be eligible to apply, charities must: – Have an income of between £150k – £500k. Have a minimum of three years accounts lodged at OSCR. Charities can apply for a 3 year unrestricted grant of £150k (£50k per annum). ENERGISE: To be eligible to apply, charities must: -Have an income of £150k or less. Have a minimum of one year accounts lodged at OSCR. Charities can apply for a 2 year unrestricted grant of £20k (£10k per annum). **ENABLE** To be eligible to apply, charities must: -Have an income of £500k or less. Have a minimum of three years accounts lodged at OSCR. Charities can apply for a 3 year grant of between £30k – £90k (£10k – £30k per annum) for restricted funding for volunteering projects/costs/initiatives. BBC CHILDREN IN NEED – BIG SKY GRANT FUND		This new programme will offer grants of up to £5,000 to support the emotional wellbeing and mental health of children aged 8-13 living in island and remote rural communities.  Grants are for early support to prevent problems developing at a later stage and could be through things like sports groups, art classes, and youth clubs. This is also part of our commitment to funding grassroots organisations who provide vital positive relationships to support children and young people.  The programme in Scotland is already open to those working in Orkney, Shetland and the Western Isles and is now opening in Highland and Argyll & Bute.  Applications will be by invitation only. BBC CHILDREN IN NEED EMERGENCY ESSENTIALS PROGRAMME		BBC Children in Need Emergency Essentials Programme supports children and young people who are facing exceptionally difficult circumstances, and is delivered by Family Fund Business Services. The programme provides items that meet a child's most basic needs such as a bed to sleep in, a cooker to provide a hot meal and other items or services critical to a child's wellbeing.  All applications must be made by a registered referrer.  The BBC Children in Need Emergency Essentials Programme has now reopened, operating as normal, and we aim to process applications within 10 working days. As usual, please only contact us about an application if absolutely necessary, to prevent delays to that application being processed. BUSINESS ENERGY SCOTLAND: SME LOAN SCHEME (INC GRANTS)		Business Energy Scotland offers grants of £20,000 and interest free loans up to £100,000. These are available to charities, community organisations and social enterprises to install energy-efficient systems or to upgrade building fabric. Apply any time.
BUTTLE UK	Ongoing	Grants up to £2,400 for children and young people who have recently come through a crisis.

		Award grants that support children and young people's education and wellbeing. While our grants can contain funding for household items, it isn't the main purpose of the grant.

CASH FOR KIDS - COST OF LIVING		Cash for Kids is supporting children and young people through the cost-of-living crisis, with £1.6 million available to support 32,200 children across the UK.
GRANTS		In response to the crisis hitting so many families right now we've launched this new fund, to provide emergency essentials that support the physical and mental well-being of children who are struggling. These could include food, clothing and household energy costs, but we'll also consider anything that helps meet children's most basic needs.
		Grants are £50 per child per household, and we aim to get the funds to families as soon as possible.
