Funding will be available for many types of community building, including: • village halls • community centres • community hubs • sports facilities • faith buildings. SHETLAND CHARITABLE TRUST INNOVATION AND SMALL GRANT SCHEMES 2025/26		Shetland Charitable Trust Innovation Grant Scheme and Shetland Charitable Trust Small Grant Scheme for 2025/26 have both today re-opened for applications. The Innovation Grant Scheme can consider applications for projects up to £3,000 whereas the Small Grant Scheme can provide funding up to £5,000 to eligible projects.

		Both schemes will be open to applications for projects that will be completed before 31 March 2026 or until allocated funds for each scheme have been fully disbursed, whichever occurs soonest.
SSEN TRANSMISSION COMMUNITY BENEFIT FUND		SSE's network in the north of Scotland will play a leading role in the clean energy transition, connecting and transporting renewable electricity from wind, hydro and marine generation. SSE's Community Benefit Fund will allow a share of the benefits to go directly to those communities hosting this new infrastructure. It aims to kickstart impactful projects or initiatives that will bring meaningful benefits to communities.
		The fund has two streams:
		Regional: for projects benefiting communities located within the SSEN Transmission network area Any successful application must meet one or more of the following themes: • People: Focusing on skills, training and employability; • Place: Emphasising the community and culture of the north of Scotland; • Alleviating fuel poverty: Looking at strategic ways to help people across the region.
		If your project benefits communities located within the SSEN Transmission network area, you may be eligible to apply for our Regional Fund. You don't have to be a registered charity to apply, but your organisation must have a constitution and not be set up for individual profit. We anticipate that the regional projects will be of higher value and have a greater transformational impact which may cover several regions within our network area.

The Climate Engagement Fund will support groups to act as 'trusted messengers' in their communities, and lead climate change initiatives that: • reach all parts of society • build understanding • enable participation in policy development • encourage climate action Climate Engagement funding can be used for activities such as: • events, lectures, and festivals • climate conversations and workshops • interactive exhibitions and participatory arts • training and climate coaching • youth programmes and citizen science • informative games and mobile applications • staff costs directly linked to project design and delivery The project period is August 2025 to 31 March 2026, when all funded activity must be completed. Eligible applicant organisations must be 'trusted messengers'. A trusted messenger has existing links to their audiences and includes community or voluntary groups, education institutions, culture institutions, faith groups and more.
