This fund aims to support museums to care for their collections more effectively and efficiently in the long-term, to meet the standards required for Accreditation, and will give museums the option to undertake an audit before making a full application to the AIM Collections Care Grant Scheme. Grants of £1,200 are available
<u>BARCLAYS COMMUNITY SPORT FUND - FEMALE COACHES FOR GIRLS GRANT</u>	4 Nov 2026	The Barclays Community Sport Fund offers grants, bespoke support, and exclusive ticketing opportunities to make football, tennis, and cricket more accessible to women and girls in communities across the UK. There are two grants that you can apply for: • <u>Access grant</u>: A grant to help sustain and increase access to football, tennis, and cricket for women and girls (as well as engage people from other underrepresented groups, such as people with disabilities, those from racially diverse communities and those from the LGBTQ+ community) • Female coaches for girls grant: Funding for football, tennis, and cricket coaching courses to help increase the number of female coaches delivering sport to girls
<u>CHANGING PLACES TOILETS SCOTLAND FUND</u>	5 October	The Changing Places Toilets Scotland Fund will increase the number of new fully accessible Changing Places Toilets across Scotland, with a Scottish Government investment of £10 million over the next two years. The fund supports planning and installation costs and aims to improve dignity, safety and community inclusion for disabled people, their family and their carers.
<u>COASTAL COMMUNITIES FUND</u>	19 October	This grant aid scheme is administered by Shetland Islands Council and financed from net revenues generated by Scottish Crown Estate assets. The scheme seeks to support the community and economic development of Shetland by investing in infrastructure, community capacity building, and developing community assets and encouraging inclusive growth. The scheme also aims to encourage regeneration of Shetland's communities by supporting projects that safeguard sustainable economic growth, promote inclusion, and contribute towards poverty reduction. Eligible organisations include community groups, voluntary organisations and registered charities Grants available up to £50,000 available for capital or revenue projects

<u>CROWN ESTATE SCOTLAND SUSTAINABLE COMMUNITIES FUND</u>	Friday 25 September	Crown Estate Scotland launched the latest round of the <u>Sustainable Communities Fund</u> with £590,000 available across its two grant schemes. Community Capacity Grant (CCG) scheme. Eligible community groups can apply for £20-50k as early stage financial support for enterprising projects fitting specific themes, such as climate-resilient communities and circular economy activity. Projects must take place within 5 miles of the Scottish Crown Estate, meaning all coastal communities and those neighbouring their four rural estates can apply.
<u>FIDELIO TRUST</u>	25 September (12pm)	Grant funding of up to £5,000 to help individuals (over 21 years) and groups of exceptional ability in the UK that would not otherwise be able to carry out an artistic project or activity without financial support.
<u>FIRSTPORT START IT FUNDING</u>		The Start Up Fund is for grants of up to £5,000 for individuals looking to start a social enterprise, a helping hand for those with a social, environmental and/or community issue they're looking to tackle. Firstport are offering free 15 minute phonecalls to help you discuss your idea and find out if the Start Up Fund is for you!
<u>HDH WILLS - MARTIN WILLS WILDLIFE MAINTENANCE TRUST</u>	rolling	The Martin Wills Wildlife Maintenance Trust provides grants to small wildlife charities working in the UK and Ireland for projects that protect species and restore habitats. They fund projects that: • Protect species and enhance biodiversity • Restore and improve habitats • Support the work of conservation organisations Grant applications are reviewed on a month-by-month basis. You should know within 4-6 weeks the result of your application.
<u>HERITAGE CRAFTS ASSOCIATION - ENDANGERED CRAFTS FUND</u>	16 October	Grants are available for craft practitioners, community groups and voluntary organisations across the United Kingdom to deliver projects that protect endangered crafts and provide opportunities for makers and trainees to develop their skills. Grants of up to £2,500 are available.
<u>HIGHLAND & ISLANDS COMMUNITY CLIMATE ACTION FUND</u>	Opens 1 August	The Highlands & Islands Climate Hub has funding available for small grants for community organisations to launch climate action project, either kickstarting a climate action project or to carry out community engagement around climate change. Organisations can apply for a maximum of £1,000 per project.
<u>MICHAEL TIPPETT MUSICAL FOUNDATION</u>	30 September (midnight)	Grants are available to support projects and activities that support young musicians and composers, new music, and music education initiatives. Grants of between £500 and £3,000 are available. The average grant is around £2,000. This fund aims to support group music-making, especially those that involve young people in the process of composing and developing new ideas.

<u>MUSEUMS GALLERIES SCOTLAND - SMALL GRANTS FUND</u>	7 October	The Small Grant Fund supports museums to develop their work and deliver against the priority areas of Scotland's museums and galleries Strategy. The fund can support: • Small scale project work • Acquisition of equipment and other resources to address time specific needs • Preparation and scoping work to plan and inform future strategic development
<u>OIL & GAS TRANSITION TRAINING FUND - SCOTLAND</u>		A new £6 million Oil and Gas Transition Training Fund is now open, offering funding and careers advice to help former and current oil and gas workers retrain for roles in sectors including renewable energy, life sciences, advanced manufacturing and defence. The scheme is open to people in Scotland who have worked in the oil and gas industry within the last two years.
<u>OPPENHEIM-JOHN DOWNES MEMORIAL TRUST</u>	2 October	Small grants are available to British artists, designers, writers and performers over the age of 30 who are experiencing financial difficulties in the pursuit of their careers. Awards typically range from £250 to £1,000.
<u>RICHARD AND SIOBHAN COWARD FOUNDATION - COMMUNITY PHOTOGRAPHY GRANTS</u>	30 September	Grants of between £500 and £1,500 are available to support the provision of participatory projects which seek to improve the health and wellbeing of children and young people under 25. The use of photography must be a core element of the project. The foundation funds projects for children and young adults under the age of 25 to take part in organised activities that allow them hands-on experience of photographic techniques. Activities must have the ultimate aim of achieving a beneficial therapeutic effect on the children's or young people's physical and/or mental health and wellbeing. Projects can use either digital or analogue photography. Projects might be a single workshop or event, or a programme of linked activities and might involve working with the participants solo or in groups. Examples of activities that might be included are: - outings with a photographer to learn how to take pictures of people or landscapes using digital or analogue film - dark room experiences - creating images using techniques such as cyanotype or pinhole cameras - learning printing techniques using a range of media.
<u>RSE - 'HEALTHY PLANET, HEALTHY PEOPLE': CATALYST AWARDS</u>	1 December	Healthy Planet, Healthy People': Catalyst Awards are designed to support community-led research that promote the health of individuals through fostering healthy environments and communities, and enabling access to healthy foods.
<u>SCOPS ARTS TRUST</u>	15 September	A limited number of grants are available to charities across the UK for new high quality projects that provide opportunities for people from all backgrounds to access, enjoy and participate in the arts.

<u>SHARED CARE SCOTLAND - BETTER BREAKS</u>	30 September, 5pm	The Better Breaks programme provides 12-month grants to third sector organisations to develop and deliver short breaks projects and services for disabled children and young people (aged 20 and under), and their carers (adult and/or young carers)
<u>SHETLAND HDVC LINK LOCAL FUND (SSEN)</u>		Designed in collaboration with communities. The way this fund is delivered has been shaped by local community councils and community representatives. In Shetland, the funding is delivered through <u>Win Furt</u>, a charity set up by the local people of Tingwall, Whiteness and Weisdale to lead on community projects. Win Furt aim to use the funding for the construction of cycle and footpaths in the area, following feedback from the community which identified this as a priority.
<u>SIC ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT GRANT SCHEME</u>		• Funding designed to support local communities in their efforts to generate economic activity • Eligible organisations include private business as well as voluntary and community organisations • Stimulate local economic activity by providing funding towards projects which deliver on key outcomes • Grants available up to £25,000 for eligible projects
<u>SSEN - REGIONAL COMMUNITY BENEFIT FUND</u>	24 November	Third round of applications Applications are welcomed from suitable initiatives across our operating area, spanning communities in Argyll and Tayside, the North East, the Highlands, Orkney, Shetland and the Western Isles. A total of £2m is available through this funding round, with organisations able to apply for grants of between £40,000 and £500,000 between now and 24 November for projects that deliver against one or more of three core themes: • Skills and employability: Support employment, apprenticeships and skills development. • Heritage and culture: Celebrate shared heritage and strengthen community identity through arts, language and music. • Alleviating fuel poverty: Improve home energy efficiency and support those most at risk of fuel poverty.

<u>TAKE A BREAK SCOTLAND</u>		Take a Break is Scotland's short break grant scheme for parent carers (unpaid carers and eligible kinship carers) of disabled or seriously ill children and young people aged 0-17. This aim of the scheme is to improve unpaid carers' quality of life, health and wellbeing by providing cash grants to help them access a short break from the day-to-day routine of caring. Carers can use Take a Break grants flexibly to help meet their interests and circumstances. All grants are discretionary and subject to available funding at any time. Family Fund administer Take a Break on behalf of the Scottish Government.
<u>TESCO COMMUNITY GRANTS</u>	30 September	Tesco is currently short of applications for the Lerwick store. The next deadline is the end of September for the Dec-Mar customer vote. The grant funding programme invites schools, registered charities and not-for-profit organisations supporting children to apply for up to £1,500 to improve access to fruit and veg. Every four months, three local projects are selected to be in the customer vote in Tesco stores throughout the UK. We empower our customers to make a difference in their local community by using their blue token to vote and choose how the funding is distributed. Every project shortlisted for the vote receives funding but a vote using a blue token will make the difference to just how much funding each project receives – up to £500, £1,000 or £1,500. There are a few changes to the grants now we have a new funding portal, and here are the main ones: • A minimum of 50% of spend must be on food or food growing related activities/equipment, and all applications should include some spend directly on food e.g. healthy snacks or meals, ingredients for cooking, plants or seeds to grow fruit and veg etc. Food related spend can include things like cooking equipment, equipment for growing fruit or vegetables, cooking lessons, sports nutrition sessions, foraging resources, creating or buying recipe, cooking or growing books/leaflets etc. So it is much wider than just fruit and veg. • There is now only a 6 month window for successful applicants to spend their grant. This can be extended in certain cases e.g. if funding is needed for a growing project but is received in winter. • Full funding is provided upfront for all levels of funding. • The application form is shorter, and no budget is needed at the time of applying. Budgets need to be provided once it is confirmed what level of funding has been provided via the customer vote. <u>THE CHARLOTTE AITKENS TRUST</u>	31 October	Grants of up to £2,500 are available for charitable organisations within the UK who promote the creative arts for the public benefit, especially literature, whether fiction, non-fiction drama or poetry. The Trust will only accept applications from organisations whose core purpose is in the support of literature and literacy.
<u>THE HAPPINESS FUND</u>	2 October	The Happiness Fund is available to enable and support projects which improve mental health and wellbeing, inclusion, learning and skills development in local communities.
<u>THE JJ CHARITABLE TRUST - LITERACY SMALL GRANTS SCHEME</u>	Spring grant round: applications by 4th March Summer grant round: applications by 3rd June Autumn grant round: applications by 1st October	The JJ Charitable Trust seeks to improve the effectiveness of literacy teaching in primary and secondary education for children with learning difficulties, including dyslexia. Their work has a particular focus on areas of disadvantage and those who are at risk of non-inclusion in society and the world of work. The small grants scheme funds charities and community groups that directly help children and young people develop literacy skills, with a focus on supporting those with learning difficulties such as dyslexia. They are keen to see applications for projects that use volunteers and reading mentors and those that help during transitional points. For example: between primary and secondary school or transitioning to college or work. They will consider grants for literacy support at any primary or secondary key stage (between ages 5 and 18).
<u>THE LINNEAN SOCIETY - OUR LOCAL NATURE GRANT SCHEME</u>	25 October	The "Our Local Nature" Grants are available to fund innovative projects, designed and led by young people in the UK. It aims to empower young people across the UK to take the lead on projects that involve their local nature and natural spaces.
<u>THE NATIONAL LOTTERY COMMUNITY FUND - SMALL ECO AWARDS</u>	Apply anytime	Small Eco Awards provide accessible grants for communities in Scotland to take local, practical action to protect the environment. The programme supports community-led projects that can help to: • improve local places • protect nature • reduce waste • support climate resilience • connect people with the environment • create greener, healthier and more sustainable communities

<u>THE NUFFIELD FOUNDATION - ESSENTIAL EMPLOYMENT SKILLS FUND</u>	10 December 2026	Funding to build the evidence on how to support young people facing significant barriers to work to develop essential employment skills and ultimately access good jobs. This is a new fund to build high-quality evidence on how best to support those young people aged 16-24 who face significant barriers to work to develop essential employment skills and ultimately access good jobs. Under the new Essential Employment Skills Fund, the Nuffield Foundation is offering grants to evaluate UK programmes, share learning and inform the wider scaling-up of effective practice. There is also potential to provide additional funding towards the costs of programme delivery where this is not covered from other sources, including through partnership funding models.
<u>THE ROBERTSON TRUST - ADVANCING RACIAL JUSTICE FUND</u>	9am on 14 October	The Robertson Trust wants to support projects that address a specific systemic racism issue, or create the infrastructure needed to sustain impactful anti-racist movements and build a liberated and equitable future. They are interested in projects that aim for long-term change by addressing root causes, rather than only responding to symptoms. This might include holding decision-makers to account, running public campaigns, building solidarity across groups or movements, media or reporting, or creating a community space that can support organising.
<u>TIME TO LIVE GRANT AND CARERS REGISTER (SHETLAND CARE ATTENDANT SCHEME)</u>		A carer is someone that cares for a family member, partner, or friend who cannot manage without their support due to illness, disability, mental health issues, or addiction. Caring activities can range from personal care, emotional support, managing medications, shopping and more. The Time to Live grant is available for all carers as an individual short break. Carers have used Time to Live funding in a variety of ways to support their wellbeing, take a break from caring, pursue interests, and improve their quality of life. This could be anything from a gym membership to an overnight hotel stay, streaming subscriptions, gardening equipment, classes and more. Please see website for full details <u>here</u>. The fund supports the strategic development of live public-facing sporting and cultural events in line with the aims of the National Events Strategy, Scotland the Perfect Stage. Eligible events take place outwith the local authority areas of Edinburgh and Glasgow and can demonstrate their role in showcasing regions and driving domestic tourism around Scotland. The Programme is designed to support innovative new projects and activity at events. Events will need to align with the key impact areas outlined in our National Events Strategy and must also have delivery budgets of more than £20,000 and attract over 1,000 in-person attendees. Finally, they must showcase Scotland's key event and tourism assets.

If you're a charity that needs support for digital inclusion programmes, you can apply for free Vodafone SIMs, each loaded with 40GB data/month for 6 months, plus unlimited calls and texts. You can use these however you like - for example, to help stay in touch with service users, or deliver training to people in need.

<u>WOMEN'S FUND FOR SCOTLAND</u>	Opens September 2026	The Women's Fund for Scotland (WFS) has £100,000 in total available to distribute in grants to projects across Scotland that support women's development, self-sufficiency and social and economic equality. To this end, the grant programme will offer unrestricted grants to sustain existing work with women and girls or to support new work in line with its themes. The fund is seeking to support single-sex services and will not fund mixed-sex groups. The Women's Fund for Scotland makes grants across three themes, and applications must meet at least one of these themes. These themes are related to the previous six and allow more flexibility for groups to describe their work and the impact they wish to have: • Thrive – funding the potential of women and girls to thrive – through leadership, skills-building, innovation and creativity. • Heal – funding the spaces and support systems that women need to heal – from violence, from marginalisation and from injustice. • Rise – supporting women rising – together and on their own terms. Rising out of loneliness, of poverty and into a more equal Scotland. This could support movement building or collective work

<u>ABBVIE - GRANTS, DONATIONS & CHARITABLE CONTRIBUTIONS</u>		Abbvie is a pharmaceutical company. Their grants, donations and charitable contributions are awarded to eligible organisations, to support health, education, science or community-based projects undertaken by Healthcare Organisations or Charitable Institutions. Applications are reviewed by a committee who meet 4 times a year. Due to a high volume of applications, they may close the application window from time to time
<u>ABERLOUR URGENT ASSISTANCE FUND</u>		Aberlour's Urgent Assistance Fund can provide immediate relief to families with children (aged 21 and under, or 25 and under if the child is care experienced) who are suffering extreme hardship. Families who are struggling to provide food, heating and clothing for their children. This support is usually via cash grants to assist with a range of needs, such as food, utilities, clothing, bedding, appliance repairs, replacement of appliances that have failed, or other essentials. To qualify for cash grants from the Trust: • There must be a child in the family who is 21 or under (or 25 and under if the child is care experienced). • That child must be facing hardship. Applications must be endorsed and submitted by a sponsor e.g. social workers, health care professionals, teachers, clergy and third sector organisations. Sponsors can apply using the online form on the Aberlour website.
<u>ACCESS TO WORK</u>	Ongoing	Financial assistance is available to help organisations in Great Britain with any extra employment costs that result from employing a person with a disability. Access to Work provides grants to employers towards extra employment costs which result from an employee having a disability. The programme aims to provide practical advice and support to disabled people and their employers, in order to overcome work related obstacles which result from disability
<u>ALLIED VEHICLES CHARITABLE TRUST</u>	Ongoing	Funding is at the discretion of the Trust. Thus far, grants have ranged from £400 to £6,000 per project. Local and national charities, voluntary organisations, community groups and schools from across Scotland can apply.
<u>ALPKIT FOUNDATION</u>	Ongoing	Max award: £500. The grant of up to £3,000 is designed to support sustained employment and complement normal recruitment activity. The Scheme aims to support up to 60,000 job opportunities over 3 years, approximately 20,000 per year for this financial year (FY2026/2027) and the following 2 financial years, closing to new vacancies in October 2028.
<u>YOUTH MUSIC NEXT GEN FUND</u>	25 September 2026	Grants of up to £3,000 are available to young creatives in the UK to help them take a step forward to participating in and changing the music industries. The funding is intended help early-stage musicians and wider music adjacent creatives to invest in their own projects and make their ideas happen. The fund is especially aimed at those whose lack of finance holds them back from pursuing their goals.
