**DEVELOPMENT
(CLLD) PROGRAMME**

The fund is provided by the Scottish Government to Shetland CLLD Local Action Group (LAG) which is made up of partner organisations representing economic, environmental and community interests in Shetland – and which oversees the development and implementation of the CLLD programme in Shetland.

The focus of Shetland CLLD is to support projects which contribute positively to local people and local priorities by helping communities thrive through community-led initiatives. Priority will be given to projects that support the Scottish Government priorities of:

- Helping families and services through the cost of living crises, including helping to address the drivers of child poverty
- Transforming the economy to deliver net zero and
- Creating sustainable public services

Shetland Islands Council, is administering the programme on behalf of the LAG and is now inviting applications from community-led organisations to apply for grant support.

Shetland CLLD does not have a specific limit on the maximum amount of grant money that can be awarded to individual projects. However, since the available funds are limited, the program will carefully assess the amount of funding allocated to each project. The goal is to support a diverse range of projects across Shetland from the total budget of £134,707.66.

There is no specific requirement for a minimum or maximum grant percentage, however projects that already have their own or match funding to contribute will be given more priority. Projects requesting grant funding below £3,000 will not be taken into consideration.

Projects will only be considered which can demonstrate that project completion, spend and grant claim can be achieved in full by 20 March 2024.

The closing date for applications is Monday 31st July after which applications will be assessed and presented to the Shetland Local Action Group for final decision in August.

<p><u>COMMUNITY RIGHT TO BUY FUND</u></p>		<p>The Community Right to Buy Fund provides financial support for community organisations in the Highlands and Islands of Scotland.</p> <p>The fund helps communities pay for professional services to help them register an interest in land or buildings under the Community Right to Buy legislation. These services could include legal title searches or help with mapping.</p> <p>This support is for community organisations in the Highlands and Islands area that wish to register an interest in property through the Community Right to Buy legislation.</p> <p>What does this cost? Funding of up to £5,000 is available, to cover up to 80% of the eligible cost. Communities must be prepared to cover the rest of the cost from other sources.</p> <p>This support is unlikely to involve state subsidy, but this will be assessed on a case by case basis.</p>

<p><u>CORRA FOUNDATION - BOOST SMALL GRANTS</u></p>		<p>Boost small grants programme is for organisations supporting children and families in their local communities. It has been created to help groups that find the increases in basic running costs (for example utilities, salaries, transport) are making their work much more challenging.
