COMMUNITIES MENTAL HEALTH AND WELLBEING FUND FOR ADULTS YEAR 4	25th November 2024	Voluntary Action Shetland (VAS) is delighted to launch the fourth year of the Communities Health and Wellbeing Fund for Adults on behalf of the Scottish Government on Friday 27th September 2024. The Fund was established in October 2021 and to date has distributed around £51 million to community initiatives supporting mental health and wellbeing across Scotland. The Fund has a strong focus on prevention and early intervention and aims to support grass roots community groups in tackling mental health inequalities and address priority issues of social isolation and loneliness, suicide prevention and tackling poverty and inequality. There will be a continued emphasis in Year 4 on responding to the ongoing cost of living crisis and on those facing socio economic disadvantage, with a particular focus on supporting the six priority family groups identified under Best Start Bright Futures: Tackling Child Poverty Delivery Plan.

		Two further multi-year programmes will be launched later in the year. Available to new (and more established) charities this programme offers a two-year unrestricted grant of £20,000 (£10,000 per annum), enabling charities to use their grants in the way that helps them best.
		The third programme, Enable, is an innovative, joint grants programme with the Foundation's sole funder, Lloyds Banking Group, aimed at boosting community volunteering. Funding will be provided to charities to support projects delivered through volunteers, with Lloyds Banking Group's colleagues across Scotland volunteering their time and skills to help deliver the projects and support the charities. <u>CASH FOR KIDS -</u> <u>COST OF LIVING</u> GRANTS		Cash for Kids is supporting children and young people through the cost-of-living crisis, with £1.6 million available to support 32,200 children across the UK.
		In response to the crisis hitting so many families right now we've launched this new fund, to provide emergency essentials that support the physical and mental well-being of children who are struggling. These could include food, clothing and household energy costs, but we'll also consider anything that helps meet children's most basic needs.
		Grants are £50 per child per household, and we aim to get the funds to families as soon as possible.
CASH4CLUBS	12 November 2024	Cash4Clubs is a small grants scheme set up in 2008 to support local sports clubs. Grants of £2,000 (€2,000 in Ireland) are available this autumn for community organisations working with adults from under-represented communities, delivering sport or physical activity for social purpose.
		The 2024 programme is exclusively focused on supporting adult clubs, with an emphasis on 18–25 year olds.
