<u>UK GOVERNMENT FIND A GRANT SERVICE</u> Find a grant is a UK government service that allows businesses to search all UK government-funded grants. Businesses can use the website to browse or search for available grants, check if they are eligible and find out how to apply for each grant.

AVIVA COMMUNITY FUND	No closing date	The Aviva Community Fund helps local causes and projects – with funding, but also with access to tools and resources, like volunteering and professional coaching. It aims to help communities build the kind of longterm, sustainable projects that they need.
BRIT TRUST	Opens 1 December 2024	The BRIT Trust considers applications which meet the criteria within its mission statement: "improving lives through the power of music and the creative arts". Each application needs to be endorsed and jointly put forward by an individual working in the UK music industry.
		You must be a registered charity to apply. Grant applications are typically considered at the June meeting of the Trust. Applications for the next financial year will open on 1 December 2024, with successful applications granted in November 2025
CO-OP FOUNDATION - YOUNG GAMECHANGERS FUND	Eligibility Quiz - Wednesday 4th December, 5pm	The Young Gamechangers Fund is delivered by the Global Fund for Children and Restless Development, alongside the Co-op Foundation. They are looking for young activists, campaigners, disrupters, co-operators, and social entrepreneurs to lead youth-led social action across the UK.  The fund will prioritise support for young activists who are committed to creating communities that are prosperous, safe, diverse, equitable and inclusive, healthy, and sustainable. In particular we're seeking to support groups and communities that prioritise youth activism and shared power.  Applicants must be 10-25 and living in the UK. You can be part of a group or organisation, or an individual applicant. Your project or activities should be led by young people.
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CREATIVE SCOTLAND NATIONAL LOTTERY OPEN FUND FOR ORGANISATIONS		Grants up to £100,000 are available for artistic, creative, or cultural projects lasting up to 18 months. Priority is given to community activities with public benefit. Suitable for organisations focusing on sustaining creative development.
EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITY FOUNDATION - MAIN FUND	Rolling	The Educational Opportunity Foundation supports charitable organisations working to improve access to education or the quality of education for children and young people under the age of 25, both in the UK and internationally.
		For UK based projects, Educational Opportunity Foundation will only consider applications that are specifically targeted towards care experienced young people. Projects must be interventions designed to

		improve their educational outcomes and life chances. Funding is available for one to three years. They will fund between £30,000 to £90,000 per project (maximum £30,000 per year for multi year projects). Funding is available for new or pilot projects, or projects which have started in the past 12 months.  The Grants Committee meet on a regular basis throughout the year. The aim is to provide a decision to all Stage 1 applicants within 4 to 8 weeks of submission of whether they have been invited to proceed to Stage 2.
EUROPEAN YOUTH FOUNDATION PILOT ACTIVITY GRANTS	1 December 2024	Youth organisations can apply for pilot activity grants to the European Youth Foundation for initiatives to be carried out in 2025. The following focus themes for pilot activity grants are human rights education with and by young people, peacebuilding, conflict transformation and intercultural dialogue.
HEALTHY PLANET, HEALTHY PEOPLE AWARDS		Offer up to £5,000 for community-led research projects that support healthier environments and accessible food systems. Open to community organisations, the award supports people-centred, problem-focused, and practical projects addressing climate, nature, and food-related challenges.
HEALTHY PLANET, HEALTHY PEOPLE FUND	Thursday 5 December, 12pm noon	Receive funding for community led research projects focused on climate, nature and food for a healthier planet. Supported by the Williamson Trust and administered by The Royal Society of Edinburgh, awards are up to £5,000 to support community-led projects.
HEDLEY FOUNDATION	11th December	The Hedley Foundation's main objective is young people – their education, recreation, support, training, health and welfare.
HIE GREEN GRANT FUND		Our Green Grant Fund aims to support businesses and social enterprises across the Highlands and Islands to transition to net zero.
		The funding is a non-repayable grant of up to £250,000, which will cover between 10% and 40% of the total cost of a project. The minimum grant award is £20,000. Projects with a total cost of £50,000 or less are therefore unlikely to be eligible.
		Projects can include anything that helps businesses and social enterprises to reduce carbon emissions and make progress towards achieving net zero, for example through energy efficiency measures, renewables, or waste management. We will prioritise projects based in remote and rural areas where applicants may be eligible for up to 50% funding.
		HIE's contribution to projects will be based on the financial need of the business or social enterprise.  Applicants will be required to provide financial information on request to allow an assessment to be made.

HISTORIC ENVIRONMENT SCOTLAND/ HERITAGE LOTTERY FUND	17 January 2025	Historic Environment Scotland (HES) launched Round 3 of its Heritage and Place Programme (H&PP). This means that any eligible organisations who are interested in applying for funding to develop an area-based scheme are invited to submit and Expression of Interest (EOI) for HES to consider prior to being invited to submit a full application if they feel that your proposal meets with the programme criteria. The EOI deadline is 17 January 2025.
		For project Development Phase, HES can fund up to 50% of costs. For project Delivery Phase, HES can provide grants of between £750,000 - £1,500,000 depending on size of scheme and match funding.
		HES are working in collaboration with the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) to promote this programme as they also provide funding support for heritage place projects (Area schemes). Although HLF has its own funding programme with its own criteria and application processes, Grants for Heritage, this aligns strongly with the aims of the H&PP. 		As part of this collaborative work, HES will be jointly hosting an online information session the details of which are set out below:
		Thursday 28 November 2024 (11.00-12.00/12.15)
		This session will provide attendees with an overview of the area- based funding available from both HES and HLF. HES will cover topics including its application processes and timeframes, eligibility criteria, funding priorities and examples of eligible projects and activities. HES will also look at what information they would expect to see in an EOI and at development phase application stage if an EOI is successful. There will also be an opportunity for Q&A's at the end of the presentations.

MUSIC FOR ALL - COMMUNITY PROJECT FUNDING	8am on Monday 13 January 2025	At the Music For All Charity they believe that everyone should have the opportunity to learn to play music. They make grants available to address the musical needs of community music groups and educational organisations.

		They support projects and initiatives taking place throughout the UK that all aim to bring music to their community and would benefit from a "helping hand" to fulfil their potential in becoming truly sustainable music programmes.  Grants are available under a number of different categories, each with their own criteria and award amounts. See the Music for All website for full details of these.  Funding Round 4 offers instrument awards in five areas for community groups/projects:  Learning and cognitive challenges  For groups working with those facing financial hardship  Working with children in early years age group 0-4  Physical mobility or accessibility needs  Choral Groups
NATIONAL CENTRE FOR RESILIENCE		Now open for applications for 2025-2026 to support resilience projects in Scotland! Grants are available through the Knowledge Mobilisation Fund, Community Council Fund, and Third Sector Project Fund. These funds empower academics, councils, and community groups to strengthen local resilience to natural hazards.
OFCOM - COMMUNITY RADIO FUND	December 2024	grants to help fund the core costs of running community radio stations. These not-for-profit radio stations have a social purpose, and work to involve their target community in running the service.  Core functions funded include:  • fundraising to support the station (e.g. grants, commercial funding)  • management  • administration  • financial management & reporting  • community outreach  • volunteer organisation and support.  Grants can only be made to Ofcom-licensed community radio stations in the UK, broadcasting on AM, FM, or via a Community Digital Sound Programme licence on a digital radio multiplex.
PETER HARRISON FOUNDATION - ACTIVE LIVES	1 Jan 2025	Small and major grants available for organisations providing opportunities for personal or skills development through participation in physical activity in the most disadvantaged areas in the UK.

RAYNE FOUNDATION - OPEN GRANTS PROGRAMME		Funding focuses on four key areas: enhancing young people's mental health, using arts for social change, improving life quality for carers and older people, and providing better opportunities for refugees and asylum seekers. Suitable for projects in these areas aiming for impactful social benefits.
ROSA - VOICES FROM THE FRONTLINE	December.	Rosa's Voices from the Frontline fund offers one-year grants to support campaigning and influencing work that enables women and girls to use their voice to achieve change. They will fund a broad range of activity including:  Campaigning for changes in policy and laws including activities such as petitions, social media campaigns and lobbying.  National campaigns that address issues that affect women and girls.  Influencing community leaders and power holders about issues that affect women in a particular place or community.  Gathering evidence or producing tools and reports which enable women and women's organisations to campaign for change.  Mentoring or training for women on how to participate in public life and influence social policy.  Video and media campaigns about specific issues facing women.  Training activists in campaigning, advocacy, lobbying or public speaking.
RS MACDONALD CHARITABLE TRUST - MAIN GRANTS	2025.	<ul> <li>The trust supports Scottish charities under the funding themes:</li> <li>Tackling Child Abuse &amp; Neglect: services for children whose lives have been affected by physical, mental or sexual abuse</li> <li>Visual impairment: support for people who are blind or visually impaired</li> <li>Neurological conditions: empowering people with neurological conditions to lead better lives and be involved in their communities</li> <li>Animal welfare: helping animals that have been abused or are in danger of abuse and initiatives that reduce the risk of such abuse.</li> <li>They award Main grants twice a year. SHETLAND CHARITABLE TRUST - SMALL GRANTS SCHEME	2025	A fund offering grants of up to £5,000 for small community groups in Shetland has opened to applications for financial year 2025/26.  In line with all SCT's grant aid, the Small Grant Scheme aims to support community based voluntary and charitable organisations to provide services and associated facilities that help individuals and the community to thrive. Awards can cover up to 90 per cent of a project's costs.

		The scheme is open to constituted community groups with a turnover of less than £100,000 a year. They need to demonstrate in their application that they support SCT's Quality of Life Goals: community wellbeing, individual wellbeing, everyone matters and generational fairness.  The scheme is open to requests for help with running costs and buying equipment or adapting buildings. Applications for revenue funding can be for a minimum of one year but the trust will consider multi-year funding to a maximum of 5 years. SOCIAL INVESTMENT SCOTLAND - BRIDGING LOANS		A bridging loan is a short-term loan that provides quick access to funds for social enterprises and charities that need to cover a short-term cash shortfall.  Social Investment Scotland's bridging loans serve as short-term financing solutions that help social enterprises manage temporary cash flow issues or seize growth opportunities without waiting for long-term funding. Get in touch with Social Investment Scotland to discuss.
THE BIG GIVE - ARTS FOR IMPACT	Campaign takes place next year,	A seven-day online match funding campaign supporting arts and culture charities working to achieve societal impact across the UK.  Arts for Impact Fund utilises the Big Give's '1:1' model of match funding. Arts and culture charities apply to Big Give, and their application is assessed by Big Give and their partners, NPAC. Successful charities are awarded a sum of match funding which is ring-fenced for their organisation. This match funding is unlocked by public donations given through Big Give's online fundraising platform during the week of the campaign (18-25 March 2025).
THE BIG GIVE - THE GREEN MATCH FUND	17 Jan 2025	The Green Match Fund is a match funding campaign for charities which are working on environmental issues as part of their core mission. All public donations made to participating charities via the BigGive website during the week of the campaign (18 - 25 April 2024) will be matched up to a specific amount. Each participating charity will be awarded a ring-fenced amount of match funding which will be used to match public donations. All the match funding is provided by donors; charities do not need to secure their own pledges for the campaign. Charities can apply for general funding rather than a specific project and can use the campaign to raise unrestricted funds.
THE JOSEPH RANK TRUST		The Trustees have two main areas of interest:  • projects that demonstrate a Christian approach to the practical, educational and spiritual needs of people of all ages

There is a different themed round each year. It is important to apply as soon as possible as only the first 40 applications will be considered.</li> </ul>
THE ROBERTSON TRUST - SMALL AND LARGE GRANT PROGRAMMES	Open all year	Their initial focus is on the following themes:  Financial Security: improving income adequacy, income security, manageable costs, financial safety nets and advice for those most at risk of poverty and trauma  Education Pathways: preventing and reducing poverty and trauma through access and engagement in early years, education, training and learning  Work Pathways: improving access to good and fair work that can prevent and reduce poverty through increased pay, hours and career progression. This also includes employability support, focused on areas or groups with lower employment rates  Updated guidance is now available. The new-look Small Grants offer increased funding of between £5,000-£20,000 per year, typically for 3 years. This marks an increase from the previous maximum of £15,000 per year.  The new-look Large Grants now offer funding of between £20,000-£50,000 per year. This marks a change from the previous minimum of £15,000.  The Robertson Trust will be launching a fourth funding theme later this year, following on from its previous Emotional Wellbeing and Relationships theme, with a sharper focus aligned to the aims of its strategy. The Small and Large grant programmes are open all year round with no set closing dates.

Nonprofits with annual income under £250,000 serving deprived rural areas or urban communities can apply for up to 50% of costs, including core, salary, and project expenses. VOLANT CHARITABLE TRUST SMALL GRANTS PROGRAMME	18 Dec 2024	<ul> <li>The Volant Charitable Trust Small Grants Programme is prioritising the focus of its awards on charities and organisations who are particularly addressing poverty and deprivation, helping to support vulnerable groups who are most affected, with an emphasis on women, children and young people. Project areas of interest, in order of priority, include:</li> <li>Poverty and deprivation (with an emphasis on women, children and young people): This includes support for vulnerable families facing extreme poverty; Food provision and promotion of healthy eating in areas of extreme deprivation; and Mental health projects for vulnerable groups living in poverty.</li> <li>Women: This includes support for isolated and lone mothers; Community integration support for black and minority ethnic women and children and asylum seekers; Support services for women prisoners and their families; Support for victims of sexual abuse, rape, domestic violence, and those working in the sex industry; Provision of antenatal and postnatal care for young mothers or those affected by postnatal depression.</li> <li>Children and Young people: This includes counselling for vulnerable children; Support services and outreach projects for those who are disadvantaged or deemed to be 'at risk' through neglect, emotional and physical abuse, alcohol, or drug misuse.</li> </ul>
WARBURTONS COMMUNITY GRANTS	3 Feb 2025	Warburtons Community Grants provides small grants to support charitable organisations towards broader activities which improve Health, Place or Skills for families in their community. Grants can be used for something specific that will benefit the cause e.g. buying equipment to support an employability project etc. Quarterly deadlines in November, February, May and August.
WOODWARD CHARITABLE TRUST - GENERAL FUND	Friday 13th December 2024 at 12pm	Fund projects that help families and young people and that are aiming to improve the life chances of the beneficiaries. They prefer projects that promote community cohesion and the development of skills that will change the outlook and outcomes for the users. Organisations that promote volunteering and involve both past and present users in their delivery are encouraged.  They are looking for organisations which aim to achieve a positive impact in at least one of the following areas:

They only award grants to organisations registered with the Charity Commission or OSCR, or exempt from registration.  They have four grant rounds per year. AVIVA COMMUNITY FUND - CROWDFUNDING REQUIRED	Ongoing	Grants up to £50,000 are available for not-for-profit organisations in the UK who can raise their initial funding through a crowdfunding campaign for projects that address Aviva's current themes of climate champions and financial empowerment.
AWARDS FOR YOUNG MUSICIANS	Anytime	Awards for Young Musicians supports outstanding young instrumentalists making music in any genre. If you can clearly show that you are talented and committed and that you need financial help with your music costs then you can apply for an Award of up to £2000. The average award in 2020 was £550. Young musicians aged between 5 and 17 years of age and are living and studying in the UK are eligible to apply.
BAILLIE GIFFORD COMMUNITY AWARDS	Ongoing	The fund aims to support local grassroots organisations working to address food insecurity and social isolation
BANK OF SCOTLAND FOUNDATION		Bank of Scotland Foundation, has announced the launch of its new five-year strategy - "Building a Brighter Future for Scotland." The strategy aims to fund, support and champion small and local charities that work towards improving the quality of life for some of Scotland's most vulnerable people.  The first multi-year programme under the new strategy, Empower, will launch in early February, offering real security and certainty for charities. This programme will offer a three-year unrestricted grant of £150,000 (£50,000 per annum) and collaborating with Lloyds Banking Group, the Foundation also aims to identify opportunities to add strategic value for funded charities and help them grow stronger and thrive

beyond the lifetime of their grant. Two further multi-year programmes will be launched later in the year. Energise is a multi-year grants programme supporting small and local charities that are closest to the real issues facing our communities. Available to new (and more established) charities this programme offers a two-year unrestricted grant of £20,000 (£10,000 per annum), enabling charities to use their grants in the way that helps them best. The third programme, Enable, is an innovative, joint grants programme with the Foundation's sole funder, Lloyds Banking Group, aimed at boosting community volunteering. Funding will be provided to charities to support projects delivered through volunteers, with Lloyds Banking Group's colleagues across Scotland volunteering their time and skills to help deliver the projects and support the charities. This programme offers a grant of £30,000 - £90,000 over three years (£10k-£30k per annum) for volunteering projects/costs/initiatives. Grants programmes 2024 **EMPOWER:** To be eligible to apply, charities must: – Have an income of between £150k – £500k. Have a minimum of three years accounts lodged at OSCR. Charities can apply for a 3 year unrestricted grant of £150k (£50k per annum). ENERGISE: To be eligible to apply, charities must: -Have an income of £150k or less. Have a minimum of one year accounts lodged at OSCR. Charities can apply for a 2 year unrestricted grant of £20k (£10k per annum). **ENABLE** To be eligible to apply, charities must: -Have an income of £500k or less. Have a minimum of three years accounts lodged at OSCR. Charities can apply for a 3 year grant of between £30k – £90k (£10k – £30k per annum) for restricted funding for volunteering projects/costs/initiatives. **BBC CHILDREN IN Project Costs and** BBC Children in Need will for the first time directly fund charities' core costs over the next three years as part **NEED** Core Funding of its new strategy. BBC CHILDREN IN NEED – BIG SKY GRANT FUND		This new programme will offer grants of up to £5,000 to support the emotional wellbeing and mental health of children aged 8-13 living in island and remote rural communities.
