The funding will be used to scale up community energy projects across Scotland as part of a drive to cut carbon emissions, create local jobs, reduce energy costs and stimulate local investment. CASH FOR KIDS - HOLIDAY HUNGER GRANTS	Closes when funds spent.	Holiday Hunger Grants are available to organisations and service providers who support children and young people (up to and including 18 years old) that have a genuine need for support, are disadvantaged due to poverty, the increase in the cost of living and face food insecurity. This funding is specifically to provide disadvantaged children and young people who have a lack of access to food AND activities in the school holidays. Projects must focus on outcomes that encourage children to eat more healthily and be more active during the school holidays.

CORRA FOUNDATION - <u>BOOST SMALL</u> <u>GRANTS</u> <u>PROGRAMME</u>		Boost Small Grants programme is managed by Corra and is funded in partnership with STV Children's Appeal and Comic Relief. Boost is for local community organisations across Scotland supporting children and families affected by poverty. Not all of your work has to be with children and families but the project you want a grant for should directly benefit children and families. The work you are doing might be about providing practical help, or organising activities and gatherings, or addressing another local need.
		What is available Boost Small Grants will provide grants of £500 - £3,000 to constituted groups and charities with an annual income of £50,000 or less. Unconstituted groups can apply for grants of between £250 - £1,500. There will be around £400,000 available to distribute in 2025, and we expect to make around 160 grants. Approximately 10% of the funding available will be made in grants to unconstituted groups.
		Dates This year Boost will be run in three rounds, with about 1/3 of the grants made in each round. Round 1 will open at noon on 25 February 2025 and will close at noon on 11 March 2025 Round 2 will open at the end of April Round 3 will open at the start of September Each group can only hold one Boost grant in a 12 month period. Priority is given to community activities with public benefit. Suitable for organisations focusing on sustaining creative development. The National Lottery Open Fund for Organisations is a funding programme for artistic, creative and cultural organisations based in Scotland operated by Creative Scotland. Any type of constituted artistic, creative or cultural organisations based in Scotland can apply.
		 Eligible organisations can apply for grants of between £1,000 and £100,000 to support creative activity that runs for up to 18 months. The types of activity eligible for funding are: a specific one-off project or production a period of creative research and development a longer-term programme of work

The Trust offer grants to specific projects or core activities that develop these critical life skills for people from disadvantaged groups. They welcome proposals which target people experiencing multiple deprivation or other groups demonstrably facing major hurdles to employment, especially; women, people with physical, mental, or learning disabilities, refugees and asylum seekers.
