<u>CORRA FOUNDATION - THE HOUSEHOLD HARDSHIP FUND</u>		The Household Hardship Fund is a £1.5 million fund provided by the Scottish Government and administered by Corra Foundation. The Household Hardship Fund provides small grants to charities, community groups and social enterprises across Scotland who can pass the funding on directly to families and children on low incomes. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Groups can apply for up to £7,500 if their annual income is under £125,000. • Groups can apply for up to £15,000 if their income is between £125,000 and £250,000.
